Hoosier Youth ChalleNGe Academy in Knightstown

New Castle High School is growing! The Hoosier Youth ChalleNGe Academy, located at the historic Soldiers and Sailors Children's Home in Knightstown, and NC Schools are partnering in online education with the National Guard to create positive change in the lives of Indiana's at-risk youth. On average, Cadets recover 8-10 credits towards their high school diploma, through the guidance of eight amazing NCHS teachers. The Instruction instills values, skills, education, and self-discipline to help the students successfully contribute to society. The program uses a military model to instill positive leadership through a five-month residential program and year-long mentorship post graduation.

Grace Morgan will graduate from HYCA in December and head to Ivy Tech. "I earned three credits towards my Core 40 honors diploma, one for community service, and two college credits for physical fitness! ... I was like a broken puzzle when I came here. We pulled out all the broken pieces, reorganized, and they are slowly putting me back together... I'm ready to restore relationships back home."



HYCA Principal Chris DeHart, a 2000 NC grad, taught 15 years at the Pendleton Juvenile Correctional Facility, and is accustomed to non-traditional schooling. "Our students come to rebuild behavior or academics. The National Guard takes care of all disciplinary issues, so I get to encourage students emotionally and push them towards credit recovery in our online classes. Whether they choose to get a diploma from NCHS, or continue to earn their final credits back home, we've helped them increase vocational experience with quality certifications and ultimately build them a better future!"

She's now a member of Delta Zeda Sorority, and has found a deep love for community service, and philanthropy. "My advice? Take dual credit courses! You don't have to have a plan, but take them now and not in college. If you don't have

The brand new Fred Luddy Tennis Center opened August 13th with eight fully-lit courts and an open center for spectator viewing. Coming from Memorial Drive, you'll find the gem on Trojan Lane. You'll pass the Hall of Fame, the Luddy Tennis Center, and then Neal Field, giving the south side of campus a curb appealing facelift. The two additional courts from our pre-existing six, opens more individual play at the beginning of each team match. In the past (with only four lit courts), we had to modify our team schedules, and not everyone got to play at every match. Both boys and girls high school teams average between 18-22 players each year. In addition, our coed middle school team has had as many as 50 players in one season. During the fall season, we hosted an event almost every weekend during August and September! The new facility also has







a shelter house. During events, we set up a grill, and serve hamburgers and hot dogs as part of our concessions. I am also extremely excited about the new location, given it is considerably quieter during matches, not competing with other school events and activities. The facility will also be open to the community. As a tennis person, there is nothing better than driving by the courts and seeing them completely full of not only our players, but older players and families. Tennis is a life sport, and in the past two years I've seen an extremely high increase of people that have picked up the new lifestyle. It's proven that as people get older, tennis can help them stay in good health!

I am so grateful to Dr. Shoemaker, the school administration, and Mr. Fred Luddy for making this happen. It's a huge addition to the New Castle Campus and community.

NextGen SIG & ETT: School Improvement Grant & the Educational Transformation Team

NCCSC was recently awarded the NextGen School Improvement Grant for 3.4 million dollars from the Indiana Dep. of Education, with the mission of **Building a Better** Community through the development of educational opportunities, giving New Castle Students the skills to thrive in an ever changing world. Built upon five pillars that reflect the IDOE's vision strategies, the ETT is implementing the timeline into curriculum. Amy Madden, ETT Liaison, shares how community improvement is the overall goal, "The purpose of this grant is to better prepare our students for life after graduation, whether that means going to college, trade school, or heading straight into the work force. This is huge benefit for the community; our grads will be more conscientious employees, hopefully staying in Henry County." Skybound Education (Indianapolis) is our expert partner in the planning process, facilitating our monthly meetings and the overall goals of the grant. Launch date is set for August of 2023, and will be implemented for three years.

Meet Jen Frombley, Foursquare Children's Pastor, and Executive Director of *After the Bell*. "When we first met with Dr. Shoemaker about joining the corporation for this new adventure and partnership, we asked ourselves, 'Why should we do this?' After an exciting staff meeting, we concluded it's our *honor* to help build the character of the next generation, and in turn, we can bless their parents." This past summer, Frombley and her staff formed the objectives of the after-school program (formerly known as Latch-Key), and fashioned purposeful curriculum.

The students meet in their school's cafeteria and have a little fun for a mental break. While healthy snacks are being served, a character-based lesson is presented. Daily the kids learn new ways to integrate the weekly theme into their home or school lives. "In August, we emphasized self-control. We had them define it. By incorporating games, books and showcasing historical figures learning life-lessons, the students began to grasp the meaning of self-control, and we watched their character traits mature."

After all the fun and lessons are through, there is always time for homework help and personal connection. Currently, over 100 students participate in *After the Bell*. Sunnyside and Wilbur Wright students ride a bus to join Eastwood's program, while Parker, Westwood and Riley all have their own programs. There are two staff and usually an ICAP Foster Grandparent at each location. "Trust and relationships are being built. No matter the different walks of life, our students have become quite comfortable in sharing their hearts. They feel safe and loved."

After graduating NCHS in 2009, Chase worked as a correctional officer in the city jail until he shifted into the Sheriff's Dept. in 2013. Koger had prior relationships built with students, already working as our DARE coordinator, bringing drug abuse resistance curriculum into the schools, and is our Boys Basketball Assistant Coach! I'm here to be a positive mentor and form trusting relationships between the schools and our community."





